Characteristics of Grief

Normal Characteristics

- 1. Insomia or too much sleep.
- 2. Loss of appetite.
- 3. Weight loss or gain.
- 4. Increased or decreased interest in sex.
- 5. Physical complaints which may include fatigue, dizziness, excessive sweating, skin rashes, heart pains, chest or throught tightness.
- 6. Breathlessness or sighing.
- 7. Lack of energy.
- 8. Unpredictable or erratic behavior.
- 9. Crying spells.
- 10. Mood swings.
- 11. Restlessness.
- 12. Inability to concentrate.
- 13. Forgetfulness.
- 14. Irritability.

Abnormal Characteristics

- 1. Denial, after a prolonged period, that the loss has occurred.
- 2. Prolonged preoccupation with what was not done or said before the loss.
- 3. No emotions- repression or denial of anger.
- 4. Angry explosions at insignificant events.
- 5. "Frenzied" behaviors- staying excessively busy.
- 6. Physical complaints- new or exacerbated old pains.
- 7. Extreme preoccupation with the loss at the second anniversary.
- 8. Attitude of helplessness, hopelessness, or social withdrawal.
- 9. Excessive drinking.
- 10. Suicidal thoughts.
- 11. Excessive, extreme anger toward individuals.
